They helped her find transportation, grocery shopping and getting a driver's license. Back in her undergraduate years she had sought life's purpose but found no answers. These new friends challenged her, a Buddhist, to study the Bible with them and to form her own conclusions about Jesus and the purpose He could bring.

She was attending a small group Bible study when something happened. "One evening when we were studying the story of the Samaritan woman by the well, I saw myself in the story," she said. Today, Dr. Cindy Wu is the associate dean of Baylor's Hankamer School of Business. Last month she spoke to 100 Chinese students at a Cru conference in Dallas. She was one of four Chinese Christian professors we were able to bring there to share their testimonies and meet with students—all in Mandarin.

Half of these students who attended were just like Cindy had been at Illinois–nonChristians eager to learn more about Jesus, and willing to investigate further.
